
Journal Publishing 1798-?: the subscription age



Journal Publishing 1998-?: the site-license age




Journal Publishing 2008-?: the open age

2008: Wellcome Trust OA policy (Gold / Green OA)

Iow compliance

(2012)June:

Finch report published, The Publishers' Association response to Finch report July:

- BIS/Willetts response to Janet Finch, RCUK announces open access policy
- HEFCE announces aim to make RAE based on OA material after 2014

September:

UK Government pledges £10 million to 30 major research institutions to aid OA move.

November

- RCUK release details of block grant funding in 2013 (HEIs listed here)
- HEFCE note no change to REF 2014 (Academy of Social Sciences meeting)

(2013) January

- HoL S&T Committee, Inquiry into OA
 - subsequent BIS / Willetts response

February

- RCUK plan to release more detailed guidance
- HEFCE consultation period

April 2014 – review of RCUK policy (inc. licensing)

Excellence with Impact

RCUK Policy

The new policy, which will apply to all qualifying publications being submitted for publication from 1 April 2013, states that peer reviewed research papers which result from research that is wholly or partially funded by the Research Councils: must be published in journals which are compliant with Research Council policy on Open Access, must include details of the funding that supported the research, and a statement on how the underlying research materials such as data,

RCUK announces new Open Access policy


Research Councils UK (RCUK) has today, 16th July 2012, unveiled its new Open Access policy. Informed by the work the National Working Group on Expanding Access to Published Research Eindia Einch, the policy at once harmonises and makes significant ch

Compliance:

- Allowing deposit of AAM within an embargo period (min 6 months; max. 24 months) -GREEN
- > Publication of VoR as OA under CC BY licence - GOLD

UK

- Choice of licence compliance with Gold OA route pending
- +90% journals compliant with Green OA route





Open Access at T&F

- Pure Open Access Gold OA option
 - Standard APC £900 (Sciences) / £730 (Social Sciences)
 - Many have introductory APCs / discounts
- Hybrid Open Access (launched in 2006)
 - Gold OA option: Authors / funders pay to make work OA in a subscription-based journal. APC is £1,788. (Waivers apply)
 - Green OA option : Authors can self-archive:
 - Author Original Manuscript ahead of publication
 - Author Accepted Manuscript
 - Embargo of 12 months (S&T/behavioural) and 18 months (SSAH)
- Waivers offered to developing country authors
- ca100 titles are not in either programme Green OA option still applies
- Delayed OA VoR is made free to view online after an embargo
- Engagement with authors (survey) and funders (inc. focus)





OA as Catalyst for Innovation

- Improved metadata increased discoverability
- Innovation in peer review
- Evolution of the journal from silo to interoperable publication / communication outlet
- BIG DATA

- Sustainability is key
